

PA DMC Youth/ Law Enforcement Curriculum Improving Relationships Providing Tools

Police Officers gain a better understanding of what young people in their community experience and get training and tools in adolescent development, youth trauma and youth-focused de-escalation



Lehigh County Juvenile Probation

- As of April 2021:
 - Hosted 3 Training of the Trainers (TOT)
 - 8 Curriculums
 - 212 Youth
 - 192 Law Enforcement / Adult Stakeholders
 - 404 Total community members completed the Curriculum
- Law Enforcement Involved:
 - 7 Local Police Departments
 - Pennsylvania State Police
 - Lehigh County Sheriffs Department
 - Lehigh County Juvenile Probation



Strengthened Relationships with Schools, CBOs, Faith Based Community


Infrastructure

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- Part Time Staff Person
- A solid pool of trained trainers = essential!
 - Ideally, trainers are relatable / creditable to both youth and law enforcement
 - Comfortable talking about "hard to talk about" issues
- Costs associated with the Curriculum are mainly for food (breakfast, lunch, snacks)
- Support & by in from the community
 - Police
 - Judges
 - Larger community

Learnings

- Infrastructure is critical
- Substantial time commitment on behalf of trained trainers
- Equal representation of youth and law enforcement
- Getting the "right people" to participate
 - Ideally, Law Enforcement should have interaction with youth, not serve in an administrative role
 - Youth should be a mix of system involved and non-system involved
 - No duplicate participants
- Youth engagement & recruitment can be difficult
- Coordinating this event requires lots of fluidity, while maintaining structure and efficacy of the program
