WHY is Berks County doing this?

- A recent study done in September 2017 by Treatment Advocacy Center, Treat or Repeat
- A State Survey of Serious Mental Illness, Major Crimes and Community Treatment
- Pennsylvania scored a "D" grade
- The non-profit group graded states based on how they adhered to certain polices the group says have proven to reduce recidivism
- PA received a "D" most significantly for its chronic shortage of beds at state mental hospitals - according to the report, we have less to offer those who suffer from serious mental illness

Stepping Up Initiative Advance the six program objectives:

- Secure committed team leadership
- Ensure implementation of timely screening and assessments
- Obtain baseline data
- Complete a comprehensive process analysis and inventory of services
- Prioritize policy, practice and funding improvements
- Identify strategies to track and evaluate progress

Priority – Urgent Response Needed

- State capacity to meet the needs of incarcerated individuals with MH/DD is significantly insufficient
- -Counties and the state must work together to develop immediate additional capacity
- This is a long term issue requiring long term planning
- -Humanitarian issue and a public safety issue

CCAP Comprehensive Behavioral Health Task Force

- Employ Successful Strategies to reduce the need for incarceration
- Expand training, education & awareness efforts to improve public perception & understanding
- Provide effective supports and services to reduce entry into the criminal justice system & to improve outcomes for reentry
- Understanding special populations & unique circumstances
- Address the needs of returning veterans
- Research larger policy issues and develop longer range policy strategies to assist county efforts

Sequential Intercept Mapping

- Forensic services can assist at any Intercept:
 - Intercept 1 Law Enforcement and Emergency Services
 - Intercept 2 Initial Detention / Initial Court Hearing
 - Intercept 3 Jails / Courts

Intercept 4 – Re–Entry

 Intercept 5 – Community Corrections / Community Support

Forensic Diversion Program

- Established January 2012 through a collaboration between Berks Connections/Pretrial Services (BCPS) and Berks County MH/DD Program to:
 - Decrease the incarceration rate of our non-violent mentally ill population by diverting them from jail and linking them to appropriate treatment services, monitoring and supervision through BCPS when applicable.
 - Maintain community safety only non-violent individuals are chosen.
 - Save taxpayer money by reducing incarceration and justice system costs.

Forensic Diversion Program

Program Statistics January 2012 to September 2017

Total Number of Referrals to the Program:	741
Unsecured Bail Diversions:	130
Number of Diversions using Treatment Resources:	229
Number of Follow up Contacts Provided:	4252
Total Diversions for the 5 Year period:	359

Total Number Re-arrested:	25 (7%)
Total Re-arrested post diversion program:	12
Total Re-arrested during diversion program:	13

Forensic Services

- Forensic Blended Case Management
 - 4 Forensic BCMs and 1 Forensic BCM Supervisor
- Forensic Peer Specialists
 - Trained professionals with lived experience
- Forensic Transitional Housing Program
 - Established December 2012 with capacity to house 4 individuals in a supervised setting
- Provider Coalition
 - Comprised of various law enforcement officials and representatives from community agencies and the County.
 - Collaborating to establish new resources and programming for the forensic population with MH diagnoses


- History
 - Limited Data
 - % on Psychotropic Medications
 - # of Requests to See Psych Staff



- Increased Contacts & Demand on Resources
 - Need for Data with Definitions and Purpose
 - Mental Health Stability Rating (12/1/17)
 - Total General Population: 1047
 - A: 118 history of mental illness, over 5 years ago, doesn't need treatment
 - **B**: 45 had treatment for mental illness over 5 years ago, doesn't need treatment
 - C: 517 Active mental illness diagnosis and needs treatment
 - D (SMI): 89 Severe/Specific diagnosis and needs treatment Total 769

Jail System

- Data Drives Change
 - Obtained Training
 - Increased Staffing
 - Enhanced Programs
 - Obtained Safety Equipment



- Received 7 Secure Interactive Treatment Chairs In Feb. 2017 (\$19,355)
 - 20 hours out of cell time
 - 10 structured: Group/Individual therapy, medication education, structured activities
 - 10 unstructured: Regular recreation for most inmates, additional hours required to be added for disciplinary inmates

Data Driven Justice Initiative

- Priorities:
- Gather data to access, quantify and articulate the service delivery and consumption of behavioral health, EMS and criminal justice services in the County
- Identify measures of success for each component: emergency medical services, behavioral health and criminal justice
- Identify the cost dimension of each component

Data Driven Justice Initiative

Action Required:

- Identify a data sharing technology plan utilizing the Open Lattice platform
- Create top consumer reports for each system
- Capture and share cost information for top consumers
- Document and track success by intercept
- Evaluate cost vs. success factors to identify areas for improvement
