PRIOR ANALYSIS from 2016-2018 presented to CETB in August 2019

WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED?

That we can now receive more detailed constable-specific data from AOPC.

HOW DO THE TWO ANALYSES DIFFER?

The prior one used data analyzed by AOPC. Example: Constable A served 500 dockets in a given year. The new analysis uses data that is more raw, allowing PCCD to do the in-house analysis.



KEY POINTS and takeaways


DOWNTREND ESTABLISHED

- Certified constables has trended down in every consecutive year between 2016-2021, from 1,469 in 2016 to 1,020 in 2021.
- This represents a 31% decrease in the number of constables certified to perform court work over the sixyear period.

DOWNTREND IS ACCELERATING

- Segmenting the day by two separate three-year periods (2016-2018 and 2019-2021) shows the downtrend in certified constables is accelerating.
- Period-over-period, the decline in certified constables increased from a 9.3% decrease in 2016-2018, to a 16.7% decrease in 2019-2021.

KEY POINTS and takeaways

LESS CONSTABLES WORKING


- Less constables are performing court work over time. In 2019, 852 certified constables worked for the courts, but by 2021, only 712 had worked for the courts.
- While less constables are working for the courts numerically, the percentage of constables working for the courts among all certified constables is fairly stable between 67-70% in each year. Over the threeyear period, the average court work rate was 68.3%.

WORK VS. NO WORK RATIO

• During the three-year period, for every 1 certified constable that did not work for the courts, another 2 certified constables did.

CONSTABLE ATTRITION & RETENTION

TRACKING THE 2019 CERTIFIED CONSTABLE COHORT

KEY POINTS and takeaways

20% ATTRITION OVER 3 YEARS


- Over the three-year period, the certification attrition rate of the 2019 cohort was 21.6%, or 1 in 5. Put another way, 4 out of every 5 certified constables retained their certifications 3 years after receiving certification in 2019.
- By 2021, 18.8% less constables were performing court work in 2019, and there was an 81.2% retention rate among constables performing court work in 2019.

COURT WORK 3 YEARS LATER

• In 2019, 69.6% of the certified constable cohort worked for the courts. By Year 2 (2020), it fell to 61.8% and by Year 3 (2021), it fell to 56.5% of the original 1,224 certified constables in the 2019 cohort.

OVER 1.2 MILLION DOCKETS


- During the 3-year period, certified constables served 1,242,125 court dockets, or an average of 415,708 dockets per year.
- On average, each constable working for the court during the 3-year period, served 532 dockets.

DOCKETS SERVED DOWNTREND

• In 2019, dockets served totaled 540,049 but by 2021, fell by 29.9%, to 378,838.

ASSESSED SERVER FEES & CETA FEES

ON DOCKETS SERVED BY A CONSTABLE FOR THE COURTS, 2019-2021

KEY POINTS and takeaways

AVG SERVER FEES ARE STABLE


• An average of 1.2 server fees (constable fees submitted to the court) were assessed per docket served by constables over the 3year period. While both dockets served and server fees assessed reduced in 2021 from 2019, the average server fee per docket served was stable around 1.2.

CETA FEES ASSESSED ARE REDUCING

• CETA (Constables' Education and Training Act) fees assessed on dockets served by Constables has reduced in-line with the reduction seen in dockets served. However, the percentage of total dockets where a CETA fee is assessed is also reducing (from 89% in 2019 to 86.% in 2021), which may hold implication for future training costs.

TYPES OF DOCKETS SERVED

KEY POINTS and takeaways

ALL DOCKET TYPES REDUCING

 Broad decreases in the number of dockets served occurred among all categories of docket types from 2019-2021. Most notably, criminal dockets served fell from 7,664 in 2019 to 3,586 in 2021, a reduction of over 53%.

TRAFFIC & NON-TRAFFIC GAIN SHARE

• The only categories that gained in the total share of all dockets served from 2019-2021. This movement indicates a switch is underway (away from other types) towards serving a greater proportion of Traffic and Non-Traffic dockets.

80% OF ALL DOCKETS = 3 TYPES

• On average, 4 out of every 5 dockets served were Traffic, Non-Traffic, or Landlord/Tenant.

60% OF ALL DOCKETS SERVED


• Took place in 10 counties over the three-years. The remaining 40% of all dockets served took place in 56 other counties (not listed in the table to the left).

1 IN 4 DOCKETS SERVED IN 3 COUNTIES

• Allegheny County had the largest share of statewide dockets served at 8.9%, followed by Bucks at 7.3% and Delaware at 6.7%. Combined, these three counties account for nearly 1 out of every 4 dockets served by a constable across the state over the three-year period.


TOP 10 COUNTIES

Shows variance in each county's docket type proportion. Allegheny had the lowest percent of Traffic dockets served (35%) compared to Northampton which had the highest (60%). However, Northampton had the lowest percent of Landlord/ Tenant dockets served at 11%, while Dauphin had the highest (38%)

REGIONALIZATION CONCENTRATION

• Visualization of the Top 10 counties shows that 9 out of the 10 counties are located in the east/southeast of Pennsylvania in major population centers (e.g. Philadelphia collar counties, Allentown, York, Reading, Lancaster, and Harrisburg). **TOP 10 COUNTIES** where constables served dockets, by docket type percentage

KEY POINTS and takeaways

TOP 10 COUNTIES

• Nearly half or more of all statewide docket types occur in the top 10 counties, most notably 2 out of every 3 Landlord/Tenant dockets and 3 out of every 4 Criminal dockets.

TOP 3 COUNTIES OF EACH DOCKET TYPE

- The bottom table to the right shows the top 3 counties with the highest shares of statewide dockets for each docket type.
- The top 3 counties are accounting for 22-59% of the various statewide docket types.
- Criminal docket court work is concentrated in the top 3 counties, where they account for 59% of all statewide criminal dockets served by a constable.

WHERE DID CONSTABLES WORK FOR COURTS IN 2019-2021

KEY POINTS and takeaways

COUNTIES: MOST CONSTABLES


- Regardless of the county in which a constable was elected, Allegheny County had the highest number of constables performing court work for the county's magisterial courts.
- Of note, the data does not tell us which constables are full-time vs. part-time. This is important because some counties may rely on parttime constables more, and that may increase the number of constables working in that county.

HIGHEST DOCKETS PER CONSTABLE

• Lehigh County had the highest number of dockets per constable (3,259) working in the county. This number is much higher than other counties - so much so that it is double the number of the thirdhighest county (Bucks, 1,634).

COMPARING CONSTABLES & DOCKETS

COURT-WORKING CONSTABLES RESPONSIBLE FOR 25%, 50%, and 75% OF ALL DOCKETS SERVED

KEY POINTS and takeaways

75% OF ALL DOCKETS SERVED

• Was done by only 27% of all courtworking constables in 2021, down from 31% in 2019. Put another way, basically 1 out of every 4 constables working for the courts in 2021 served 3 out of every 4 dockets across the entire state.

52.3% OF CONSTABLES: 0-100 DOCKETS

- In 2021, the majority (52.3%) of all certified constables either did no court work (30.2%) or served no more than 100 dockets (22.1%).
- In 2021, the Top 10 docket-serving constables accounted for 42,089 dockets, or 11% of total dockets served that year.

THEMES & TAKEAWAYS

FROM A 3-YEAR ANALYSIS OF COURT WORK AMONG CERTIFIED CONSTABLES

KEY POINTS and takeaways to help guide the Board's decision-making

"LESS AND LESS EACH YEAR"

• Over the 3-year period, the data shows an established pattern of 1.) less and less constables certified to perform court work each year (16.7% decrease), 2.) less and less constables actually performed court work (16.4% decrease, although the proportion of certified constables working is relatively flat at 70%), 3.) less and less dockets were served by court-working constables (30% decrease), and 4.) less and less CETA fees were assessed on constable-served dockets (32.1% decrease).

PRONOUNCED ATTRITION

• Among the 2019 constable cohort carrying certification, only 78% of constables retained certification by 2021 (22% attrition rate). Attrition among constables performing court work is at a similar rate (19%) over the same period.

COURT WORK CONCENTRATION

- Court work tends to be concentrated in a handful of counties. Ten counties, primarily located in the east/southeast account for 60% of all dockets served by constables over the three-year period. The types of dockets served by constables is concentrated in a few docket categories: Traffic, Non-Traffic, and Landlord/Tenant, which when combined, account for 80% of all docket types served by constables.
- The majority of court work tends to be performed by a small subpopulation of high docket-volume constables: 27% of all court-working constables accounted for 75% of all dockets served in 2021. That's a decrease from 2019, where it required 31% of all court-working constables to account for 75% of all dockets served, indicating that the high-docket volume constables are having an outsized impact on court work. Thus, more of the total share of court work is being concentrated into fewer constables.

REVISIONARY NOTE THE REASON FOR ISSUING THIS ADDENDUM

On February 9th, 2023 a presentation was given to the Constables' Education and Training Board (CETB) detailing the frequency of court work performed by constables trained and certified by the Board. Within that presentation, a slide was included detailing court work among 2016's Basic Training cohort of 506 newly elected/appointed constables. Based on the analysis undertaken, a conclusion was made, and presented to the Board, that no constable from that cohort had performed any court work from 2016-2021. Upon further examination, we discovered that this conclusion was incorrect, and this addendum is being submitted to provide a correction to the record.

The reason for the error was due to a formatting discrepancy that went unnoticed while matching data between datasets. Specifically, the Board Certification number for the 2016 Basic Training cohort that was extracted from PCCD's database was formatted with trailing spaces, while the Board Certification number provided by AOPC was not. The formatting discrepancy, unseen due to the invisibility of the trailing spaces, generated an error in our rules-based matching query. We quality control checked the matching query by randomly selecting several Board Certification numbers and manually searching for the number between the datasets. In hindsight, the likely reason for finding no manual matches was likely due to the widespread attrition in court work among this particular cohort. When we did finally locate the court-working constables, we found that over 75% of the original cohort did not perform any court work — meaning we had only a 1 in 4 chance of randomly matching on a constable's Board Certification number and their corresponding court work between datasets. By pure chance, we found no matches during the original analysis, resulting in our interpretation that no constables from this cohort performed court work.

After removing the trailing spaces, and rerunning the matching query, we found the following: 126 constables (of 506, or 24.9%) from the original Basic Training cohort performed court work in 2019. The 126 constables served 55,850 dockets that year, with the top ten constables accounting for 35% of all dockets served. By 2021, the number of court-working constables dropped to 100, meaning only 20% of the original cohort was performing court work, and 80% of the cohort had dropped off over the course of six-years. The 100 constables served over 38,000 dockets that year, and the top ten constables accounted for 39% of all dockets served. Presently, we are still not locating any court work matches for the 2016-2018 years, however we are rerequesting data for these years from AOPC to ensure we have been provided with the full scope of court work performed by all constables during those timeframes.

These findings reaffirm and reinforce the problematic trends detailed in the February 9th meeting: 1.) less and less dockets are being served by less and less constables working for the courts over time, and 2.) more and more court work is being concentrated into the hands of a small subpopulation of constables (those with high-docket volume) that are accounting for a greater proportion of all dockets served over time.

"NEW" CONSTABLES: ATTRITION/RETENTION

TRACKING THE 2016 COHORT OF NEWLY ELECTED/APPOINTED CONSTABLES TRAINED (BASIC)

KEY POINTS and takeaways

NEARLY 50% ATTRITION

In 2016, 506 newly elected or appointed constables received Basic Training. 353, or 70% were certified. Of those 353, only 186, or 52.7% of the original 2016 cohort, still held certification by 2021. This is a 47.3% attrition rate among the certified constables. Update: As of 2022, 136 constables were still certified.

37% OF COHORT REMAINED BY 2021


• By 2021, only 37% of the original cohort receiving Basic Training in 2016 remained certified.

20% OF COHORT DID COURT WORK

• Of the 506 constables that attended Basic Training, only 100 or 20%, had performed court work in 2021. This is an 80% attrition rate from training to court work during that timespan.
